What's next?

- Young people in England are required by law to stay in education or training until age 18.
- There are a range of options available from apprenticeships to A-levels and in some parts of the country, you could do a new T-level qualification.
- There is a lot to consider when making this decision - here is an overview of the options and things to think about.

Making choices

Your child's next step will help shape their options at age 16, 18 and beyond.

There are lots of options to choose from so think about these key questions with them to get started...

- Where do I want to get to?
- What's important to me?
- Where can I find out about my options?
- What is on offer locally?
- Who can help me find out more?

What does life at 18 look like?

- Working full time
- Studying full time
- Combination of studying and working

Some options at age 16 that you might like to start exploring...

- A T-level is a two year course, which has been designed with employers to provide you with the right knowledge and skills to get started in a particular career e.g. Digital design, development and production or Design, surveying and planning for Construction
- Apprenticeships combine practical training in a paid job with study so you can earn while you learn
- A-levels are a two year course, usually you pick three subjects to study, which is equivalent to one T-level
- Other options available include BTECs, traineeships and more

What we offer

- At Idsall School, we offer a wide range of A level courses and a number of BTEC courses at Post 16 level. We are also hoping to offer a T Level in Construction in the future.
- A large proportion of students choose to remain at Idsall School after they complete Year 11.
- Some students choose courses at other local colleges such as Rodbaston, Telford or Shrewsbury.

How can you help?

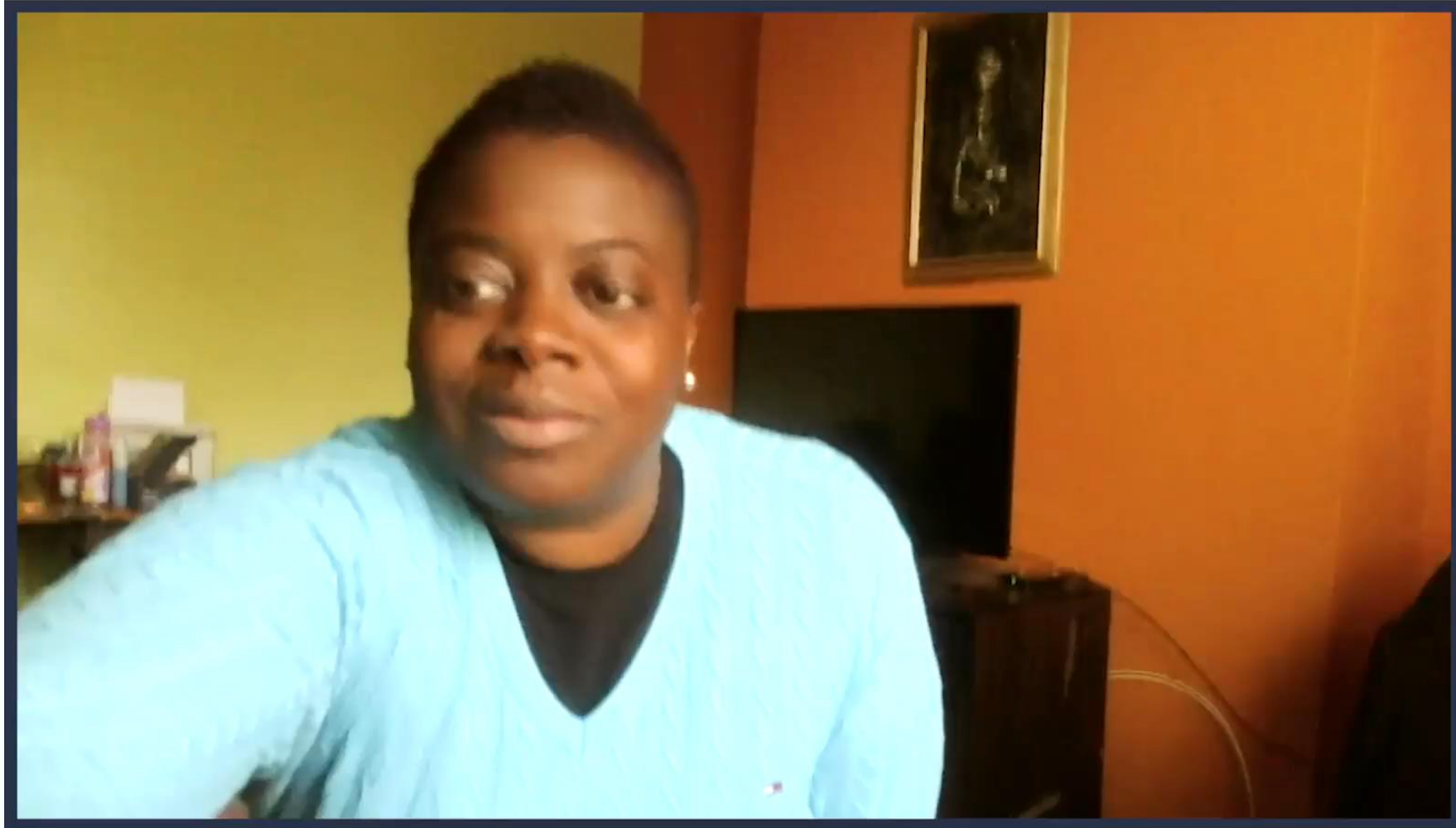
As parents, you will have the opportunity to support your child's decision making at several points in their education, and these decisions will impact their future career choices.

Around half of our students who have completed surveys about Careers said that they spoke to family members about careers.

So how can you help them make decisions that are right for them?

- Talk regularly about careers, aspirations and interests
- Share your experiences, the choices you made and your skills with your child
- Encourage your child to be curious and work with them to research their options even if you don't know the answers yourself.

Just because you didn't, doesn't mean you can't.

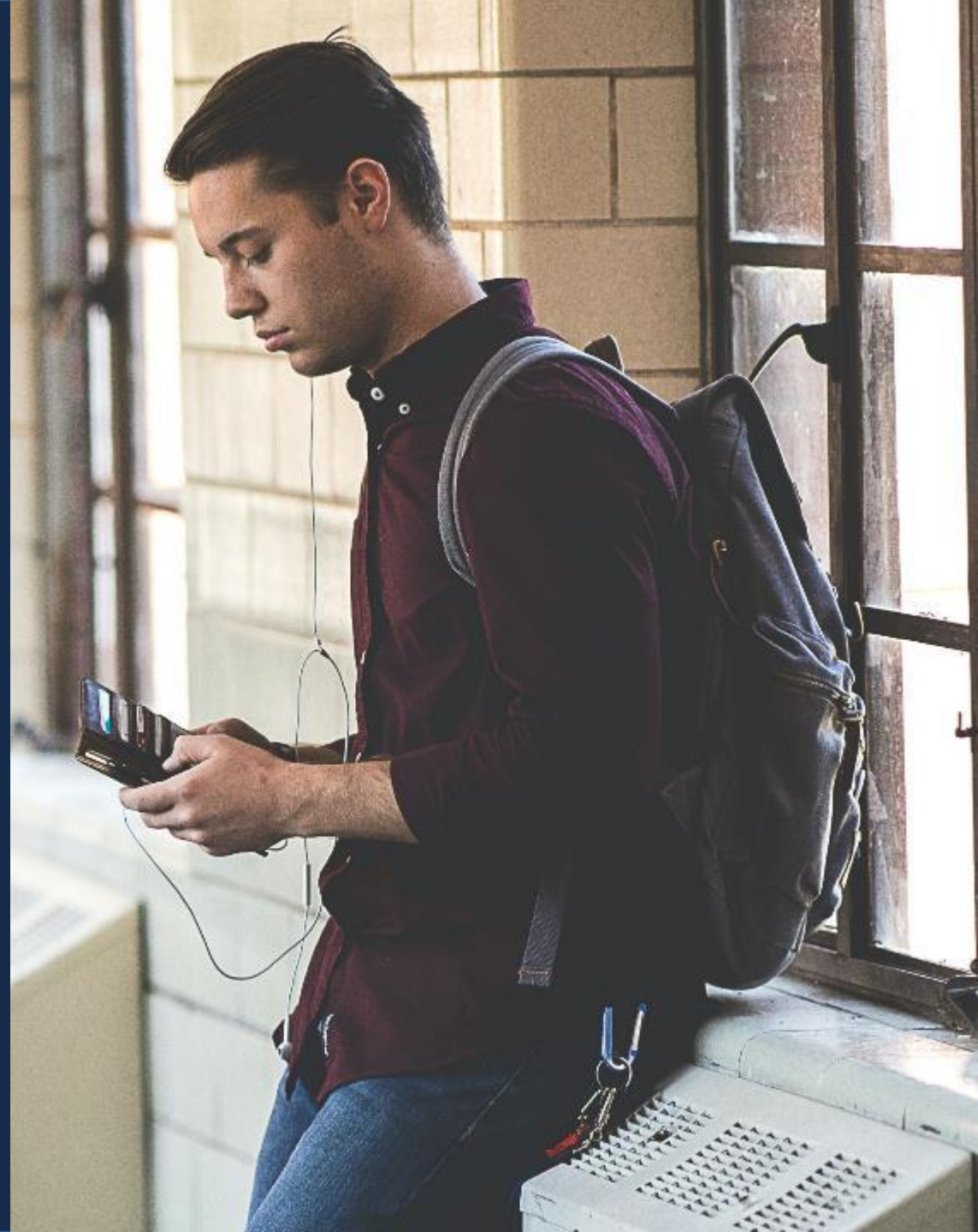


BE OPEN TO NEW OPPORTUNITIES

Our careers programme

- In Year 9
 - During the Autumn term, students participated in a number of ID lessons focussing on Careers and work sectors using materials created by Career Pilot and the University of Wolverhampton.
 - In the Spring term, students are invited to the following events:
 - A virtual Options presentation last Thursday by Ms Campbell
 - Subject sessions during lessons
 - Subject talks by subjects not offered before Year 10 in ID on Wednesday (Business/ Health & Social Care, Psychology & Construction).
 - They will also have access to:
 - A 'virtual careers fayre' website with links to HE, FE and Employer Career pages
 - Unifrog – an online Careers portal which can be accessed using students school email addresses
 - In the Summer term, students will participate in:
 - Employability skills workshops
 - University led workshops
 - A World of Work day where they can talk to employers/ employees

Year 7

In Year 7, students will:

- Learn about employability skills
- Learn about the changing world of work
- Challenge stereotypes in the world of work
- Learn about different career pathways
- Begin to use different sources of LMI

Year 8

In Year 8, students will:

- Develop employability skills
- Learn about University
- Consider a wide range of employment sectors including the voluntary sector
- Learn about equal opportunities in the workplace
- Begin to identify work sectors which are of interest to them

Year 9

In Year 9, students will:

- Explore local LMI in detail
- Learn about the range of Post 14 and Post 16 options available
- Develop decision making skills
- Investigate a wide range of employment sectors
- Have opportunities to speak to employers and employees about Careers

Year 10

In Year 10, students will:

- Develop financial capability skills to prepare for working life
- Develop the skills necessary to secure employment
- Understand the laws related to working life including rights and responsibilities
- Further consider LMI when identifying potential careers/ sectors of interest

Year 11

In Year 11, students will:

- Further develop Employability skills
- Learn about Post 16 and Post 18 Options
- Understand the skills and qualifications needed to achieve their career ambitions
- Learn about application processes
- Further develop decision making skills
- Prepare for the transition to Post 16 study

Year 12

In Year 12, students will

- Learn about the range of Post 18 opportunities
- Understand local LMI and how to use it when identifying opportunities
- Develop personal branding
- Develop the employability skills necessary to secure education or training Post 18
- Develop financial capability skills to manage Post 18 finances

- Make decisions about Post 18 options
- Identify alternative routes
- Develop resilience
- Refine personal branding
- Further develop skills necessary to secure employment or educational opportunities

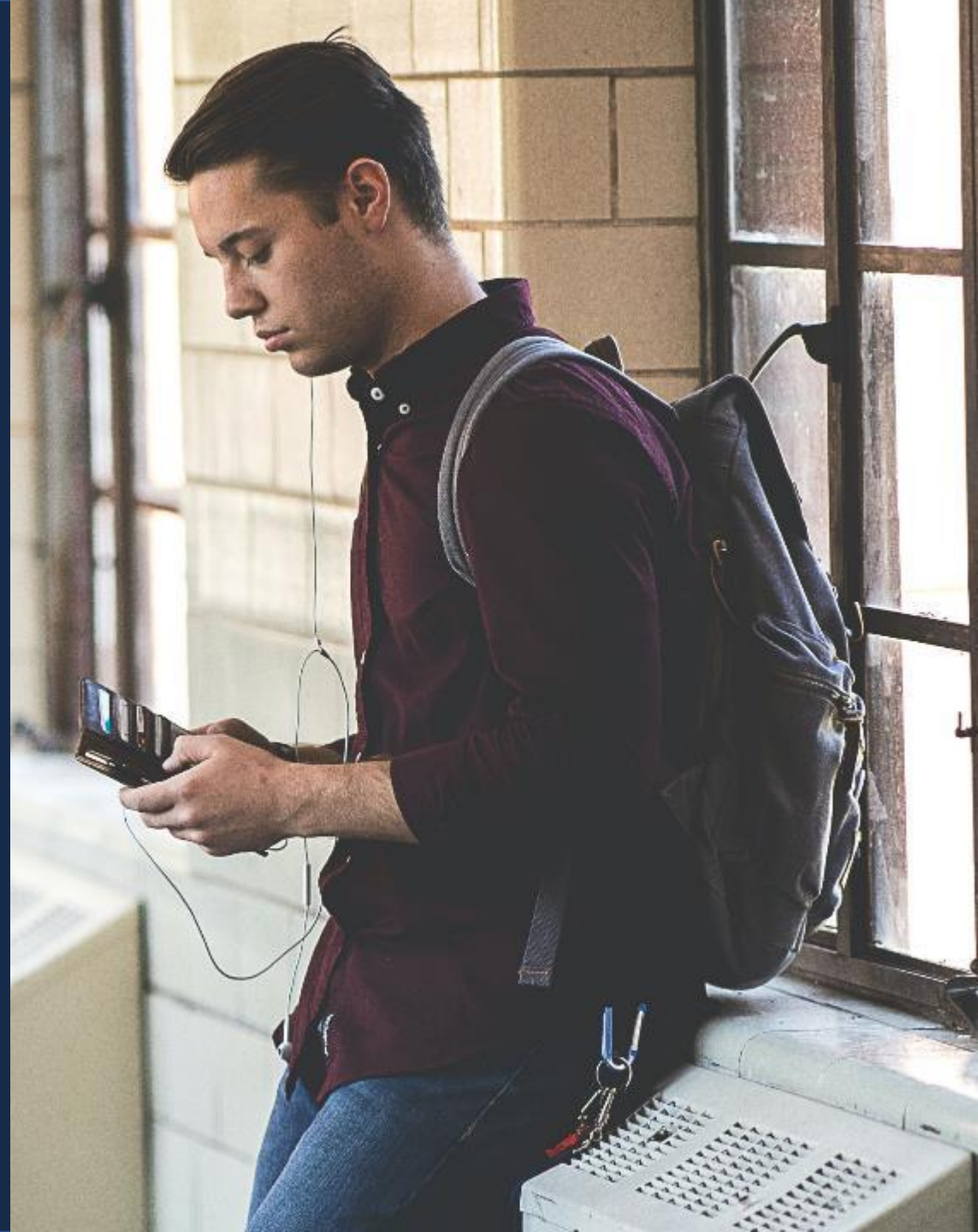

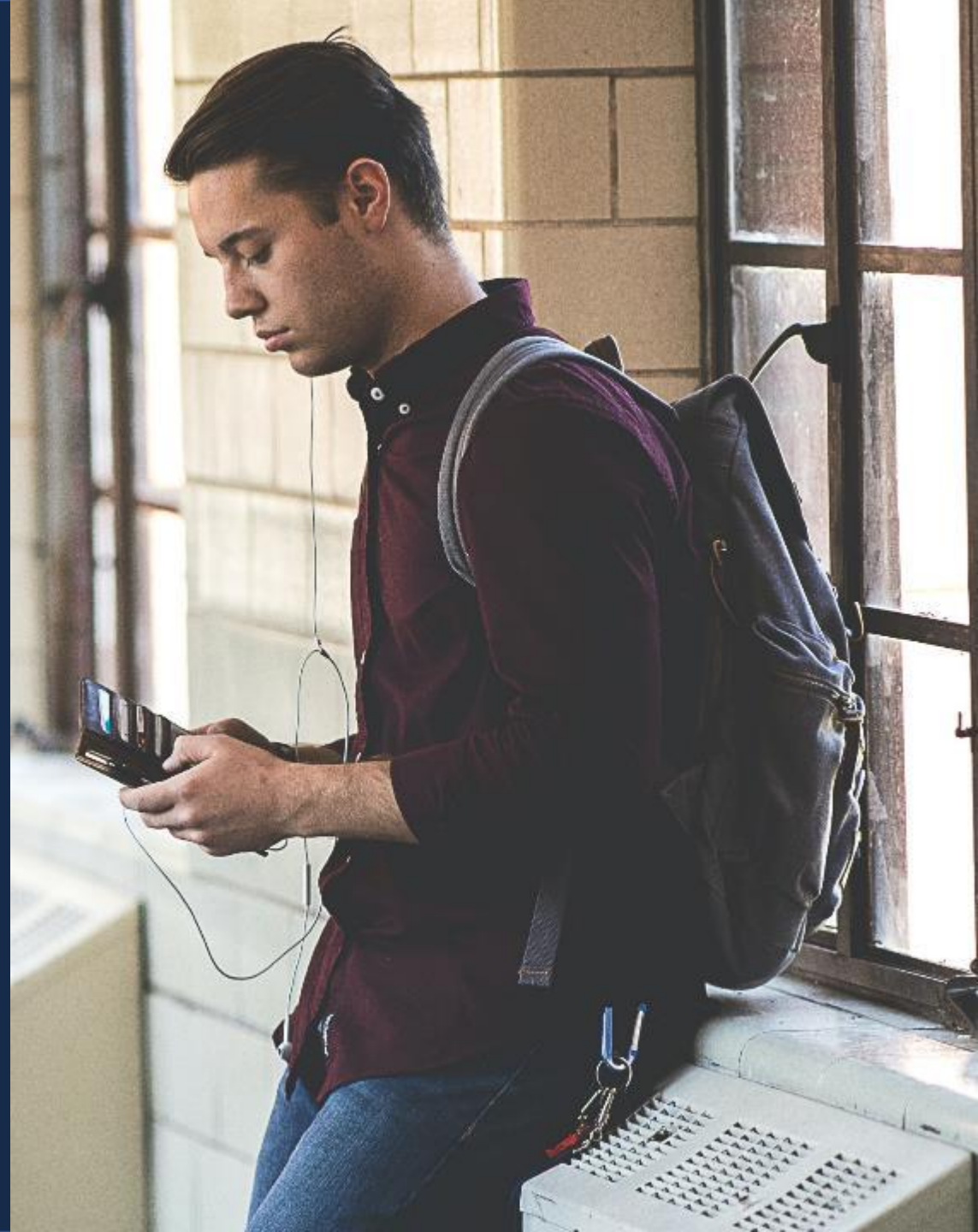

Conversation Starters – it can be difficult to know where to begin, why not try these ideas?

Questions for Parents to ask Students

- What do you ENJOY most in and out of school / college?
- What is your favourite SUBJECT? Do you know what kind of jobs are related to these subjects?
- Who can help you at school / college with questions about CAREERS? Is there a Careers Leader, Careers Advisor or Head of Careers?
- What sort of ENVIRONMENT would you like to work in? An office / in a big team / independently / outside?
- My path has included (education, apprenticeship, university, work, homemaking etc). Is there anything that SURPRISES you or you want to know more about?

Conversation Starters – it can be difficult to know where to begin, why not try these ideas?

Questions for Students to ask Parents

- What do you ENJOY doing most at home, work, with friends or family?
- What do you think your TALENTS are / you are good at?
- Do you know anyone who's completed an APPRENTICESHIP? What did they tell you about it?
- What did you want to be when you were 10 YEARS OLD?
- If money wasn't a factor what would be your DREAM JOB?

A Family Challenge – What skills do you need to succeed?

Organise a game of 'Who Am I' with your family.

- Each member of the family writes three famous people's names to put in a bowl.
- Take it in turns to pick a name, describe clearly the person without saying their name and see if your family can guess who it is.
- How many names people can guess in one minute?

- What skills are you developing?
- What were you good at as a family?
- How do you use these skills at work?
- What jobs might they be particularly useful for?

A Family Challenge – What skills do you need to succeed?
