

The Ebacc

English Baccalaureate (Ebacc)

- It is a collection of subjects a student can study. Achieved when:
- Grade 5 (or above) in English, Maths, Two Sciences, a Language and either History or Geography

'The English Baccalaureate (EBacc) is a School performance measure, not a qualification. *It is not compulsory*' DfE

Our view on the Ebacc

- We support the idea of a broad and balanced curriculum that has some flexibility to meet the needs and aspirations of all our students
- We want students to have choice
- Studying the EBacc subjects alongside one of the Arts and a Technology subject would provide breadth and balance

We *will not* insist on students doing the full suite of Ebacc subjects

However.....

- Students should consider studying the Ebacc suite of subjects if they are thinking about some higher education courses in the future as they are seen by many as more 'academic'.
- They can study these subjects <u>if they want</u> <u>to.</u>

Science

- We highly recommend that all students considering an A-level science should opt for separate sciences. This will give three separate GCSEs in Physics, Chemistry and Biology.
- Students could do an A-level science with a good grade (9-6) in Combined Science, but it does not give the same preparation/depth of study as the single science courses.

Students in groups 1 and 2 should strongly consider continuing with Separate Science at GCSE



We highly recommend that all students in top sets for languages should seriously consider continuing to study French at GCSE level.

WHY?

A qualification in a different language shows employers that you have something special to offer an that you are an articulate and confident individual with excellent problem solving and critical thinking skills and someone who is sensitive to cultural difference.

We live and work in a global marketplace with clients expecting that their partners will use their language to do business. To succeed in the 21stcentury business world requires companies to be mindful of opportunities all across the world and the need for speakers of other languages has never been more relevant.

DO:


- Take your time. Making hurried choices could mean making the wrong choices.
- Think about which subjects you are good at and look at your performance in these subjects up to now.
- Consider your behaviour and effort in the subject has it been good? Have you worked to your best ability?
- Do you enjoy the subject? If you enjoy it, you are more likely to work hard and gain good grades

Think ahead:

- Do you want to do A levels/Apprenticeship/L3 BTEC?
- Do you want to go to university?

What if you don't know what you want to do in the future Many Year 9 students have no idea what career they might eventually go into, and if this is the case, it makes sense for your child to choose as broad a range of subjects as possible.

A good rule of thumb to keep your future options open is to take at least one subject from each of the four entitlement areas, on top of the core subjects.

Universities often prefer applicants who have a wide range of GCSEs in conventional subjects such as history, geography and the sciences, rather than more specialist subjects like media studies or psychology. What to do if you do know what you want to do in the future If you do already have a career in mind or are leaning towards studying a certain subject at GCSE, encourage *look at the entry requirements for a university course or other training in that area.*
